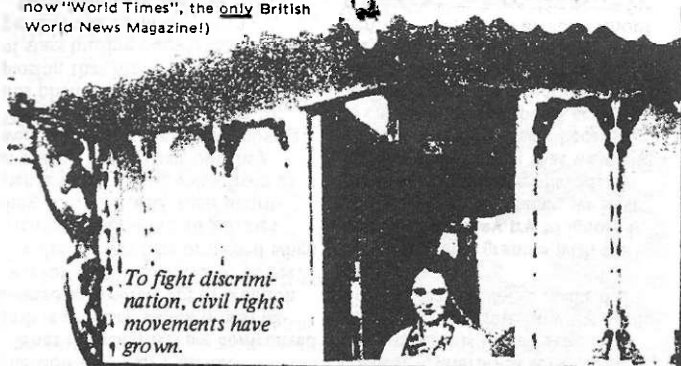

Reviled, Feared & Persecuted They Now Seek Justice!

Geneva: The Romanies of the world are preparing to take the bitterness of a thousand years of oppression to the United Nations. They aim to set up a permanent organisation linked to the United Nations which would put the case for Romany rights ("Gypsies").

A second world conference, held in Geneva, has also considered such issues as education for Romany children, and a standard alphabet for the Romany language, which is based on Sanskrit. The conference also considered such matters as reparations from the West German Government for the relatives of the 400,000 Romanies believed to have been murdered in Nazi concentration camps.

Romanies are thought to have come from India, probably from the

Punjab, and by AD 1000 had migrated as far west as Persia (Iran). There, some historians believe, they split into two branches: one going into north Africa, the other into Europe.

Throughout Europe, wandering Romanies have usually been reviled, feared and persecuted. Half a million of them gained freedom from serfdom in Romania only in the last century. The Dutch called them "heathens" less than a century ago.

Because of their lowly position in society, they usually have had to make do with jobs nobody else wanted—they were hangmen in Bulgaria, dog-catchers in Romania, slave-traffickers in Brazil and even today, in Britain they work as scrap metal merchants and seasonal

labourers.

Most of Europe's Rom—the group name they prefer to be known by—live in Eastern Europe (750,000 in Yugoslavia, 660,000 in Romania, 600,000 in Hungary, 500,000 in the Soviet Union) but there are also large communities in France, Italy, West Germany and Britain. They still live mainly in the traditional way—as nomadic travellers.

Some countries are trying to put right centuries of neglect: Yugoslavia now recognises and helps them; the Netherlands has provided caravan sites with facilities for half its nomads, a lead which is being

followed by Britain; Sweden has rehoused and trained Rom who lived in slums around Stockholm.

Many Rom are illiterate, and there is no tradition of writing in their language, which has a purely oral history. Of their language, the Minority Rights Group, an international research unit based in London, has reported: "It is hoped that this beautiful language, a living heritage of India, will not die out."

A MIRACLE!

Yugoslav President Tito relived moments of terror when he visited the site, near Tjentiste, Yugoslavia, where shrapnel from a German bomb wounded him 35 years ago.

"We barely left a ravine that was heavily bombed when another assault of bombers came," Tito remembered. "And the forest was shaking, as if the earth was burning." In a nearby valley, more than 7,000 Yugoslav guerillas were killed in that battle on the Sutjesa River.

Tito recalled that during the battle a bomb whined overhead. Everybody hit the ground. "I covered myself behind a fallen beech log. When the bomb fell near me and everything became dark, I thought I was a dead man."

"My dog, Lux, which had covered my head with his body, was strewn about in bits." A piece of shrapnel, as large as a finger, lodged

in Tito's arm. It was removed in 1952. A small monument, with "June 9, 1943," etched in marble, now marks the battle site.

CASTRO ON CHRIST!

Mexico City (AP)—Cuban President Fidel Castro says Jesus Christ was "a great revolutionary" and that he sees no contradictions between Christianity and Cuban "socialism".

"I would say there is much similarity between (Christ's) teachings and socialism," Castro said Thursday night in a Havana-dated dispatch from Prensa Latina, the official Cuban news agency. "There are no contradictions," he said.

There were some conflicts with the Roman Catholic Church after the revolution that brought him to power in 1959 because the church had become an obstacle to the

Castro said he was well aware of Christian precepts and that it was his belief "Christ was a great revolutionary and his teachings were dedicated to the poor; and that he fought the abuses, injustices and humiliation of being human."

The story of Noel, our 70-year-old Catacomber!

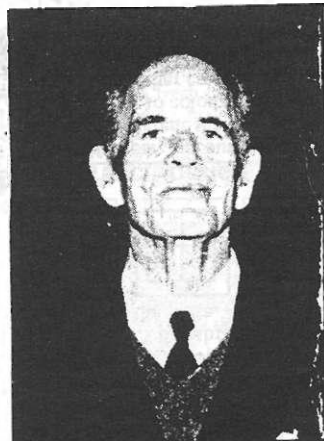
