

FREE CAMPING: There are many places you can camp for free. Beaches are always good—either a beach where other tourists are camping or find a secluded spot of your own.

(Watch out about being camped in too lonely a spot. It can be dangerous!—Dad.)

We also find large supermarkets or giant stores to be very good. They also have good prices & toilets & hot water for washing up. We've found the restaurant toilets to be nicer than the public store toilets. If you're quick you can usually get by with washing your hair as well as a pair of socks or 2.

Other good places to camp for a night or 2 are truck stops—altho' sometimes noisy due to the trucks moving in & out thru' out the night. Some countries, especially in northern Europe, have

special rest stops where you can stay for the night.

\*\*HOUSECLEANING: Anyone who thinks housecleaning will become a whiz upon moving Into a caravan is going to find themselves mistaken. Altho' he is smaller, its use is quadrupled being used for every activity. You might have to sweep 3 or 4 times a day & you'll want to wash your dishes as soon as you use them as one thing out of place in a caravan makes the whole thing look disorderly. If there's ever a time to practise "a place for everything & everything in its place" it's in caravan living.

REFRIGERATORS: If you have the blessing of a refrigerator, it's good to have those plastic, things with special liquid inside. We have 2 of the smaller type in our little freezing compartment so if ever the power in our fridge goes off the fridge will continue to stay cold until we can get it back on again. With gas fridges this is an especially good precaution in windy places as the pilot light will sometimes blow out by the sheer force of the wind thru' the air vents, & if you're not there for the day & ut to goes out in hot weather, something might spoil. It's also good to keep everything in the fridge in tight-lidded plastic containers as things can get jumbled around on bumpy roads & even spill if not stored properly.

So we've found it beneficial to 1 stay at good campsites from time to time to catch up on laundry & have a thorough cleanup of car & caravan. We try to 0 arrive at the campsite in the morning, as they charge by the night. So if you arrive in the evening you end up paying only of or the time you sleep without being able to get anything done. If you have it really together, you can do a bit of handwash each day & use one of those special compact drying racks which stand on the ground & give a good deal of line space but look neat at the same time.—Good for use when parking in town in lots etc. as it looks a lot nester. ROOF RACKS: If your car & caravan space is limited, a roof rack is essential. Be sure you have a strong heavy plastic tarp (carvas isn't waterprooff) as well as stretch cords to go over the tarp to secure it. Once we tried to secure the tarp using just the holes for that purpose without using stretch cords over it & when we hit a windstorm it ripped the tarp to pieces. As long as we have the tarp on securely with stretch cords we never have any problems with anything getting wet or ruined, altho' we've gone from Holland to the southern tip of Spain!
