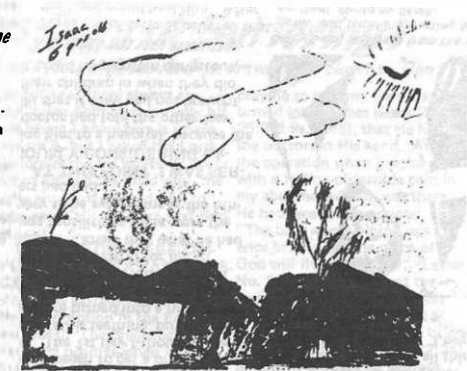

Tips on Travelling in South America

From Zadok & Palestine, VS's
 of Chile, Peru & Ecuador:
**THE LORD JUST MIRACU-
 LOUSLY SUPPLIED US WITH
 A BUS** which we are now con-
 verting into a camper. We have
 personally travelled in nearly ev-
 ery country in South America
 by land, so after praying & con-
 sidering all the various kinds of
 vehicles & campers we felt a bus
 (which is common on the roads
 here with parts easy to find)
 converted into a camper would
 be best for the roads here. Since
 we also have 4 children, we felt
 we needed something bigger
 than a van camper.
**SOME ROADS IN S. AMER-
 ICA** are not at all like those in
 the States or Europe—in some
 places all you'll find is dirt roads.
 Of course, some countries do
 have good main roads, depend-
 ing on where you have a burden
 to go & how much you plan to
 travel from place to place. It
 would be good to check into
 this & various existing conditions.

information on S. America &
 also info concerning visas for ve-
 hicles, taxes etc. One thing we
 learned is that driving from the
 States to Panama & shipping a
 vehicle across from there is quite
 expensive (shipping costs in
 Panama). So it is actually
 much cheaper to ship a vehicle
 from Miami all the way to the
 country of your choice.
**REMEMBER THAT IMPORT
 LAWS & REGULATIONS VARY
 FROM COUNTRY TO
 COUNTRY**, some being easy
 from what we understand to im-
 port on a tourist visa & others
 practically impossible or with
 very high taxes (200-300% of
 the value of the vehicle you're
 importing!). So it would be
 wise to check all these rules &
 regulations beforehand—at var-
 ious embassies, AAA etc.
**WE HAVE SEEN VERY FEW
 CARAVANS (TRAILERS)
 HERE, BUT VAN CAMPERS**
 are becoming more & more com-
 mon on the roads in some places,
 also the pick-up truck camp-
 ers that Dad mentions in the
 Trailer Series.

**ALL EQUIPMENT FOR
 CAMPING IS QUITE EXPEN-
 SIVE** here (4-5 times prices in
 the States). Hope this helps any-
 one coming this way! We'd love

**WE FOUND THE MAIN
 HEAD QUARTERS ADDRESS**
 for Sam Andy Foods: Sam
 Andy Foods, 1770 Chicago Ave.
 Riverside, Calif. 92507 (phone
 714-684-9003). The address in
 FN 15 was not the factory but
 just one of the 300 distributors
 in the U.S.
FREEZE-DRIED FOODS
 store well, but once opened the
 contents must be used within 6
 to 8 weeks.
DEHYDRATED FOODS store
 well, but once opened they do
 not have to be used quickly.
 Some can be used up to 1 year

or more after opening.
**HERE IN THE U.S. WE'VE
 FOUND THE MORMON
 CHURCH** to be our best source
 of information on food storage
 as their members are told to keep
 a 1-year supply for each of their
 families. We live in a small town
 with nowhere to buy bulk food
 —until we met some Mormons
 who have gone out of their way
 to help us with info we wouldn't
 have found out any other way.
 Many Mormons are also in the
 food storage business & many
 are distributors of Sam-Andy
 foods for instance. So we sug-
 gest an excellent way to get infor-
 mation on food storage in any
 small city in the U.S., in particu-
 lar, is the Mormon Church.
 They have been very helpful to
 us & want to help others get pre-
 pared for the "Crash".

Caravaning Tips

From Samuel & Jerusha; Spain:
FREE CAMPING: There are
 many places you can camp for
 free. **Beaches** are always good
 —either a beach where other
 tourists are camping or find a se-
 cluded spot of your own.
*(Watch out about being camped
 in too lonely a spot. It can be
 dangerous!—Dad.)*
 We also find large
 supermarkets or giant stores to
 be very good. They also have
 good prices & toilets & hot wa-
 ter for washing up. We've found
 the restaurant toilets to be nicer
 than the public store toilets. If
 you're quick you can usually get
 by with washing your hair as well
 as a pair of socks or 2.
 Other good places to camp for
 a night or 2 are **truck stops**—al-
 tho' sometimes noisy due to the
 trucks moving in & out thru' out
 the night. Some countries, espe-
 cially in northern Europe, have

special rest stops where you can
 stay for the night.
HOUSECLEANING: Anyone
 who thinks housecleaning will
 become a whiz upon moving in
 to a caravan is going to find
 themselves mistaken. Altho' it
 is smaller, its use is quadrupled
 being used for every activity.
 You might have to sweep 3 or
 4 times a day & you'll want to
 wash your dishes as soon as you
 use them as one thing out of
 place in a caravan makes the
 whole thing look disorderly. If
 there's ever a time to practise
 "a place for everything & every-
 thing in its place" it's in caravan
 living.
REFRIGERATORS: If you
 have the blessing of a refrigerat-
 or, it's good to have those plastic
 things with special liquid inside.
 We have 2 of the smaller type in
 our little freezing compartment
 so if ever the power in our fridge
 goes off the fridge will continue
 to stay cold until we can get it
 back on again. With gas fridges
 this is an especially good pre-
 caution in windy places as the
 pilot light will sometimes blow
 out by the sheer force of the
 wind thru' the air vents, & if
 you're not there for the day &
 it goes out in hot weather, some-
 thing might spoil. It's also good
 to keep everything in the fridge
 in tight-lidded plastic contain-
 ers as things can get jumbled
 around on bumpy roads & even
 spill if not stored properly.
COOKWARE: We've found
 that with one large pressure
 cooker, a cast-iron frying pan
 with lid & a sauce pan with lid,
 we are able to cook pretty much
 everything we need—even "bak-
 ed goods" if you don't have an
 oven. I try to stick to one-pot
 meals along with a vegetable or
 salad if possible. I've found I
 can cook brown rice & cut up
 chicken or chunks of stewing
 beef in the pressure cooker at
 the same time along with a few

seasonings!
LIGHTING: We use an alter-
 native light source called the
 "Camping Gaz" lantern when
 we're camped where we can't
 plug in. They put off a great
 deal of heat, acting almost like
 a heater when on. Watch out
 for woodwork, curtains etc.
 Keep spare mantles as they are
 easily broken.
LAUNDRY: You may find
 this to be one of your biggest
 problems while travelling, espe-
 cially in southern Europe where
 laundramats are rare & expensive.
 So we've found it beneficial to
 stay at good campsites from
 time to time to catch up on
 laundry & have a thorough clean-
 up of car & caravan. We try to
 arrive at the campsite in the
 morning, as they charge by the
 night. So if you arrive in the
 evening you end up paying only
 for the time you sleep without
 being able to get anything done.
 If you have it really together,
 you can do a bit of handwash
 each day & use one of those spe-
 cial compact drying racks which
 stand on the ground & give a
 good deal of line space but look
 neat at the same time.—Good for
 use when parking in town in lots
 etc. as it looks a lot neater. Can
 also be pulled inside quickly if
 it rains or you move on.
ROOF RACKS: If your car &
 caravan space is limited, a roof
 rack is essential. Be sure you
 have a strong heavy plastic tarp
 (canvas isn't waterproof!) as well
 as stretch cords to go over the
 tarp to secure it. Once we tried
 to secure the tarp using just the
 holes for that purpose without
 using stretch cords over it &
 when we hit a windstorm it ripped
 the tarp to pieces. As long
 as we have the tarp on securely
 with stretch cords we never
 have any problems with any-
 thing getting wet or ruined, al-
 tho' we've gone from Holland
 to the southern tip of Spain!
